Spiritual Erosion

In the past couple months, the people of Canada have been through two significant events. We have come to the end of another income tax season and we voted in a federal election. As I watched both of these unfold, I could not help but notice how much grumbling and complaining was evident via the news media and television advertising. It got so bad that, at one point, I wondered if Canada was becoming a nation of complainers.

Complaining is nothing new in the human experience. The Hebrew Scriptures record the almost incessant complaints against God and His chosen leaders uttered by the people of Israel during their forty-year pilgrimage. This time in history is reflected in Anglican liturgy. Do you remember these words used at Matins? “Forty years long was I grieved with that generation and said, It is a people that do err in their hearts for they have not known my ways. Unto whom I sware in my wrath that they should not enter into my rest”.

According to this passage from the Bible, to grumble and complain unduly indicates an ignorance of God’s ways. In other words, it shows that we do not really know God. Why is this so? I think the answer boils down to gratitude. When we spend our time grumbling and complaining we demonstrate a lack of gratitude in our lives. Such a mindset erodes both our spiritual health and the life and witness of the Church. Am I suggesting that we lie down like doormats and take anything without ever questioning or uttering a complaint? Not at all. But I am suggesting that our complaints need to spring from a grateful heart if they are going to be edifying to the church collectively or ourselves personally. So, before you or I open our mouths to complain to someone about what is or isn’t happening in the church or in our lives, let’s make sure that we first think about what is going well and what fills us with gratitude toward God. Only then will our concerns serve to build up the community, which is our common vocation.





Problems with the Steeple


On Palm Sunday weekend, several pieces of the copper capping that cover a roofing seam on the steeple became loose during strong winds and some of the pieces eventually fell to the ground. The Palm Sunday service was cancelled because of the danger posed by the remaining loose pieces. The pieces of capping were recovered and reinstalled later in the week that followed by a company that used a mobile lift platform to reach the heights.

However, when an inspection of the interior of the steeple was done that same week to try to determine why the capping came loose, it was discovered that the lower end of four of the eight steeple rafters, and the segmental sill beam to which they are connected, have deteriorated due to rot. Temporary barricades remained in place at the front of the Church until an assessment by a structural engineer determined that each steeple rafter is in fact also attached to a perimeter post that is secured farther down in the tower and that there was no immediate danger of the steeple falling over. It was recommended, though, that repair of the structure be undertaken promptly.

Discussions have since been held with an architectural firm and an engineering firm about repair to the steeple. Both companies indicated that the presence of the rot was due to the infiltration of water from a leaking roof and thus reconstruction or replacement of the roof would be necessary. Work on the structure would include removal and replacement of the rotten wood with possible strengthening using steel sections. Some of the interior brickwork at the base of the steeple may need to be upgraded. A large portion of the cost of the job would be for the extensive scaffolding that would be required to reach the various parts of the steeple; due to the height of the scaffolding, its construction must be approved by an engineer. Other components of the job would be the design of the repair and project management. Total cost of repair is expected to be in the range of \$250,000 to \$300,000.

Another option to be considered is complete removal of the steeple followed by the capping of the remaining tower with a roof. The cost of this approach is estimated to be about one third of the cost of the repair.

A special vestry meeting will be held in the Parish Hall on Sunday June 5 after the 10:30 service to decide on an approach that should be taken to address the problems with the steeple and to approve of the necessary expenditures. After ratification by vestry, the approach would have to go before the Diocesan Council for further approval. It is hoped that the work on the steeple could be done during the summer or early fall and that disruption of the Sunday services would be minimal.

Plan B: What To Do When God Doesn't Show Up the Way You Thought He Would?


"Plan B: What Do You Do When God Doesn't Show Up the Way You Thought He Would?", is a book written by a pastor by the name of Pete Wilson, who discusses how our lives often follow different paths than we expect. Wilson uses disappointing situations that he has experienced as a pastor, along with Biblical stories of people who faced disappointment to bridge a common theme of how to deal with hardship and loss. Wilson's use of common language appeals to both young and old and with each case discussed he links stories such as Joseph, Abraham, and others to make his point. That point ultimately being that our plans and God's plans for us often do not parallel each other. It is this change of plans that causes the negative emotions that arise from a sense of loss, but through the understanding that God's plan for us is mightier than our own and that God is indeed with us that our own healing can begin.

At the root of "Plan B" is the ultimate truth that God sent his only Son Jesus Christ to our world to save us, to let us know that he loves us so much that he gave his only Son for us, and that through Him we can do His will...even if that plan is not the plan that we had hoped or envisioned. It can help people face their losses and turn negative emotions into positive light. It helps the reader realize that God is indeed with us and that faith in Him can help us heal and be better people.

In my own personal life, after reading this book, I took my personal illness and reflected upon my faith and my path that I have taken since my diagnosis with multiple sclerosis. I have no doubt that this illness has made me a better person and that ultimately there is a much larger goal for all of us as Christians. We must do His work, spread the Good News, and look forward to the day that we will be with the One who loves us.
